PROGRESSIVES BECOMING WHAT THEY 'HATE' THE MOST

The stereotype of the intolerant Christian minister - smug, overbearing, self-righteous, judgmental - has become a staple of Hollywood coming-of-age films. Think John Lithgow's Rev. Moore in the original "Footloose."

There's just one problem: I've known literally dozens of Christian ministers – been around them all my life – yet never met a single one who fit that mold.

Perhaps Hollywood's portrayal of ministers harks back to an earlier time: to Puritans like Cotton Mather or the original hellfire-and-brimstone preacher Jonathan Edwards, whose 1741 sermon "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God" is said to have reduced parishioners to anguished howls.

In any case, it's clear that the left, as embodied by Hollywood, believes Edwards' theological descendants still stalk middle America, wagging their fingers in our faces and telling us what we can and can't do. And they, the left, are quick to condemn such "bigotry" from the "religious right."

Unfortunately for them, this caricature of Christian conservatives doesn't really exist except in their imagination (Westboro Baptist being perhaps the notable exception). Consider the drug-fueled, hedonistic lifestyles of the leftist Hollywood elites. Who exactly is telling them what to do?

The new reality is, in this upside-down world we now inhabit, it is "progressives" who have become the finger-waggers - the smug, intolerant, judgmental, self-righteous, hypocritical selfappointed arbiters of what people are allowed not only to do, but to say and even think.

That fact is readily apparent on college campuses, where students stage sometimes violent demonstrations to deny people they disapprove of the opportunity to be heard. Witness the riot that broke out at UC Berkeley a few weeks ago when "antifascists" - themselves behaving like Brownshirts - shut down a scheduled speech by right-wing provocateur Milo Yiannopoulos.

More recently, a violent assault aimed at well-known libertarian scholar Dr. Charles Murray caused his speech at Middlebury College to be canceled and sent his host, a leftist Middlebury professor, to the hospital. The attackers defended their actions by saying Murray should not be allowed to speak.

Murray's views are indeed controversial. But declaring them so egregious that they cannot even be spoken aloud is not rational. It is the product of a religious-like zealotry that seeks to identify and eliminate heretics. Murray's crime: failing to embrace the prevailing dogmas of academe, for which he must be silenced if not destroyed.

This is what our once-liberal institutions, like higher education and the film industry, have degenerated into: ideological witch hunts, evincing a fervor that would have put the Puritans to shame.

The problem for progressives is that the search for heretics must ultimately be directed inward. Remember, Edwards' iconic sermon was aimed not at unbelievers but at those within the church.

That's why we will increasingly be treated, in the coming months, to the sorry spectacle of the left eating its own – mobs of the ideologically pure turning on their secular co-religionists guilty of being insufficiently "progressive."

That might actually be fun to watch.

DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE PROTECTING TAXPAYERS FROM FRAUD

The Department of Revenue is responsible for administering the tax laws of Georgia fairly and efficiently in order to promote public confidence and compliance, while providing excellent customer service. Now that electronic communication and transactions are commonplace, we face new challenges in service delivery as incidents of identity theft and fraudulent tax return filings are on the rise.

Criminals have found that computer keyboards are an effective weapon in committing acts of theft and fraud, and tax agencies have deployed defensive strategies accordingly. Whether it be one of the many data breaches that have been reported, or a spoofing of phishing scam, every incident requires agencies to modify their systems to protect the affected taxpayers. As criminals become more sophisticated in their attempts to violate taxpayers' identities and steal precious tax dollars, the department must continually update fraud defense strategies to thwart their efforts. To do this, the department recently implemented a new state-of-the-art fraud management system. This program review each income tax return filed, and employs analytical tools to verify the identity of the filer and the accuracy of the financial data presented on the tax return. Utilizing this technology, the department has already successfully blocked over \$40 million in fraudulently filed returns in 2016.

But our efforts do not stop there. In 2015, the department signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Internal Revenue Service, other state revenue departments, and companies and trade associations in the tax and financial services industries. The public-private partnership formed through the MOU stems from a security summit where tax administrators and industry leaders met to discuss threats to tax administration. The communication and information sharing agreed to in the MOU will help protect taxpayers from new threats as they are identified, and allow us to implement best practices that have been developed by peer agencies.

As you can see, the efforts to fight fraud are multifaceted. The department has advanced fraud management systems in place, but we also rely on individuals and businesses to assist in the fight. When processing an income tax return, the department looks to match information reported on the return with data provided from other sources. Employers are now required to transmit annual payroll and withholding data to the IRS and the Department of Revenue by January 31st. The department is encouraging employers to begin preparations soon to comply with these filing deadlines. The lack of this or other corroborating data will subject an individual's return to processing delays.

Any error on a return will require additional work effort, leading to a delay in the issuance of a refund. The department advocates electronic filing not only because it speeds the processing of a return, but also because it helps taxpayers spot and correct such return errors. Before issuing the refund, though, the surge in fraudulent filings means that the department must first validate key return information. The efficient issuance of refunds is therefore greatly improved by the timely submission of items such as the payroll and withholding data filed by employers.

The department encourages taxpayers to adjust their payroll withholdings with their employers by completing and submit-

ting IRS Form W-4 and GA DOR Form G-4 to receive the full benefit of their earnings throughout the year. The department also encourages Georgia taxpayers to register with the agency's Georgia Tax Center (GTC) to better monitor the status of their refunds at gtc.dor.ga.gov. In GTC, taxpayers can also activate an alert that will send them an email when a return has been filed on their account. These actions will help to reduce the chance of becoming victims of identity theft.

The Internal Revenue Service has admitted to allowing \$8.9 billion dollars to be paid out to criminals who have filed fraudulent returns in recent years, requiring taxpayers to underwrite these losses. In order to prevent this from ever happening in Georgia, the Department of Revenue will continue to work diligently to process and release tax refunds as efficiently as possible, while taking the extra precautions required to verify that funds are released to the rightful recipients.

HOT MESS

Los Angeles is a hotbed of social ills, but Democrat Mayor Eric Garcetti isn't fixing those. No, he's instead obsessed with the "urban heat problem." The Los Angeles Times reports that Garcetti has "a sweeping plan to help L.A. live within its environmental means." Because apparently the city has a Fahrenheit budget (though its finances are \$224 million in the hole). So Garcetti is vowing "to reduce the average temperature in the metropolis by three degrees over the next 20 years." You read right. The mayor is going to turn down the temperature of the outdoors. All because "climate models" (which we know are never wrong) supposedly show that downtown L.A. will be over 95 degrees 22 days of the year. In 2050. The God-Complex mayor brought in a USC environmental engineering team - which recommends more trees and green lawns. Of course, these have been virtually outlawed thanks to L.A.'s draconian water conservation rules. The engineers also want Garcetti to repave roads with high-tech "cool pavements." Lost in the noise and excitement over the presidential election was the result of Colorado's referendum on assisted suicide. Voters approved it by two to one, about the same as the ratio by which proponents of the measure outspent opponents. Doctors may now prescribe life-ending sleep medication for adults with terminal illnesses. Colorado joins five other states in legalizing assisted suicide, which has gained popular support even as bioethicists have argued that its logic will eventually lead to ending the lives of certain children and the mentally ill. European doctors in Belgium and elsewhere have already begun to slide down that slippery slope. Right-to-die advocates have succeeded in framing the issue as a choice between suffering and hastened death. Palliative care is more expensive than euthanasia, and more difficult to administer, but also more dignified and humane. Its role in the care of individuals at the end of life has receded in the public debate over assisted suicide. Pro-life advocates should put it front and center. (National Review)
