IS THE GEORGIA GOP SLOWLY DYING?

I still clearly recall the crowded back bedroom in the suite of a long since replaced Buckhead hotel just as the sun was rising in November of 1980. Last-to-report Cobb County precincts were coming in and the numbers were being added up on one of those old bulky calculators, the kind that had the big roll of paper on top.

A miracle was taking place. After a century of total domination by the Democratic Party (save Reconstruction's insertion of "Republican interlopers") Georgia was electing a Republican U.S. Senator. Mack Mattingly, who was given no chance of defeating Herman Talmadge, pulled off the impossible. And he did it the old-fashioned way: begging for money and votes while most business leaders gave him no resources and the press gave him no chance.

Before my GOP friends get too worked up over the title of this article, I would stress the word "slowly." After all, I was a Republican state legislator when we were a small minority. And I was among the very first to ever encourage a presidential run by Donald Trump. (Trump followed my syndicated column, occasionally sending me handwritten comments on copies of them or tweeting out the ones he liked.) So, I certainly understand the energy he has put back into the Republican Party.

But President Trump is a phenomenon the likes of which we won't see again in our lifetime. He makes and breaks politicians in "red" states and his sheer presence will bolster turnout for Republicans in 2020.

So, for everyone who thinks Georgia is a purple state, don't bet on it in 2020. Sen. David Perdue is a prohibitive favorite and, be it Kelly Loeffler or Doug Collins, the "jungle primary" system favors a Republican Senate candidate who can count on very strong turnout in a post-November runoff.

But that's 2020. The future beyond this year is problematic for Georgia Republicans.

Yes, demographics are working against the GOP. The once reliable metro Atlanta "doughnut" is rapidly disappearing. Long reliable Republican strongholds like Cobb and Gwinnett counties are rapidly moving from a While/Republican majority to an African-American/"other races" Democratic majority.

The automatic reflex for Republican strategists is to attempt to move their party in the direction of the mythical Atlanta swing suburban female voter. That means distancing their candidates from Trump and rebuking his style. Following this logic, Republicans would make appointments and pass laws catered to this fragile portion of their perceived electorate.

That would be dead wrong. Populism, not pandering, spares dying parties.

The best evidence can be found in Zell Miller's 1990 race for governor. By 1990 many pundits were speculating that Republicans were reaching a critical mass and could actually capture a governor's office that had been in Democratic hands forever. Miller was bold in his embrace of a state lottery and a scholarship fund to be funded by it.

At the time most Southern Baptists and other Christian fundamentalists resided in counties outside of the Atlanta area, and they voted a straight Democrat ticket other than for president. Miller was proposing gambling and pastors in the pulpit hit him hard. So Miller rolled the dice and argued that Georgia needed to join other states with a robust lottery. The preachers learned that their congregations held a different opinion.

Miller not only wiped out his Democratic opponents, he defeated a great Republican nominee for governor, Johnny Isakson. (Isakson was stuck with a young and newbie nominee for lieutenant governor – that would be me.) The lottery tide was unstoppable and no matter how much we said we did not oppose it, we did not invent it. And thus, we lost.

And that leads me to the current status of the GOP in Georgia. Republicans have cut taxes so often that they now have to cut the budget. They recently have repeated the type of battles between a governor and speaker that remind us of Miller's and House Speaker Tom Murphy's wars of years past (a harbinger to the later demise of the Democrats). The GOP legislative majority has managed to regulate just about anything that moves and most things that don't. There is just one problem. They haven't put the pop in the populism.

The rural areas of the state that now are the backbone of the GOP vote continue to languish with huge pockets of poverty and less funds to deal with it. Their engines of economic development have too often been slogans, billboards and token state satellite offices.

The reality is that "the suburban female Republican voter" who allegedly turned off by Trump's style, will either not vote or vote decidedly for Trump once faced with a Democratic presidential nominee who inevitably will be pushing a very far left agenda this fall. Placating and pandering is not Trump's style.

The president, love him or hate him, is a populist who offered tangible and controversial proposals to the voters. It won him 2016 and will likely give him four more years.

If the Georgia GOP wants to delay its demographic demise for another decade or so, it will take a play out of the Miller and Trump playbook. If not, it's lights out after 2020 . . . one bulb at a time.

SOCIALISM LOSES FAVOR EXCEPT WITH MILLENNIALS

In October 2019, a poll released by Victims of Communism Memorial Foundation (VOC) shows that overall support for socialism is decreasing in the U.S., but the millennial generation continues to increase its support.

Among adults ages 22-37, 70% said they were either "somewhat likely" (50%) or "extremely likely" (20%) to vote for a socialist in the 2020 elections. Only 57% of millennials believe the Declaration of Independence "guarantees freedom and equality" more sufficiently than *The Communist Manifesto*.

"When we don't educate our youngest generations about the historical truth of 100 million victims murdered at the hands of communist regimes over the past century," said Marion Smith, VOC executive director, "we shouldn't be surprised at their willingness to embrace Marxist ideas. We need to redouble our efforts to educate America's youths . . ."

Democrats have spent the better part of the last decade sounding the alarms about rising wealth inequality in the U.S. This obsesssion has jerked the party leftward, propelling fantastical proposals such as Medicare for All and wealth taxes into the mainstream. But it may result from an accounting error. Economist Thomas Piketty and his acolytes define wealth as the value of all assets held by households minus their debt. They leave out Social Security payments, which account for 58 percent of wealth for the bottom 90 percent of the wealth distribution. A new paper from the University of Pennsylvania finds that when Social Security wealth is accounted for, inequality has remained constant over the past three decades. It is telling that those most concerned about economic inequality won't welcome the good news. (*National Review*)

SCOOTER POLLUTER

Smug urban Millennials are sure they're saving the earth by riding around on electric scooters. Touted as "emissions-free" and "eco-friendly," the scooters are supposed to "reduce dependence on personal automobiles" and "leave future generations with a cleaner, healthier planet." Or so claims Lime Micromobility, which rents the things via its scooter-sharing app.

But green hype is almost always green BS, and now MIT Technology Review reveals: "Sorry, Scoters Aren't So Climate-Friendly After All." After calculating the emissions from manufacturing, shipping, charging, and disposing of the scooters, North Carolina State university researchers conclude: "Dockless scooters generally produce more greenhouse-gas emissions per passenger mile than a standard diesel bus." Worse is the environmental footprint. The average rental scooter lasts just 28.8 days. "Scooters are variously flung into water bodies, tossed from buildings, set on fire, run over, and used in stunts. Cleanup crews in Oakland, CA, fished 60 scooters out of Lake Merritt in a single month last year" Clearly, these people need to start driving SUVs. (Limbaugh Letter)

World Bank chief economist Penny Goldberg resigned after only 15 months on the job, reportedly in protest of Bank officials' refusal to publish a paper critical of the institution. The paper in question finds that aid provided by the World Bank often ends up in offshore accounts held by developing countries' political elites. The more dependent a country is on aid, the authors conclude, the higher the portion of money that "leaks" offshore. Even though the paper passed peer review in November, Bank officials have cast doubt on the results. While Goldberg has not confirmed her reasons for quitting, the Bank's efforts to stymic research that questions its efficacy raise obvious red flags. Goldberg's early resignation follows that of Paul Romer, who was also chief economist for 15 months before stepping down. The World Bank's tumultuous leadership does little to inspire confidence. (*National Review*)
